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Article I - Summary Description of Project

The terms of the recipient¿s approved Investment Justification(s) and Budget Detail Worksheet(s) submitted by the recipient are incorporated into the terms of this Federal award, subject to the additional description and limitations stated in this Agreement Article and the limitations stated in subsequent reviews by FEMA of the award¿s budget.

Project 1: Thermal Find and Follow Protection for Marine Terminals is fully funded for \$300,000.

Project 2: Patrol Vessel Maintenance and Sustainment Planning is fully funded for \$187,500.

Project 3: Mobile Anti Vehicle Barriers is fully funded for \$262,500.

Article II - DHS Specific Acknowledgements and Assurances

All recipients, subrecipients, successors, transferees, and assignees must acknowledge and agree to comply with applicable provisions governing DHS access to records, accounts, documents, information, facilities, and staff.
